	Chair: Lazare Benaroyo and Guenda Bernegger
	Topic : Medicine, in theory as well as in practice, relies for a not insignificant part on aesthetic elements, which are usually not recognized as such. In the sense of health-promotion, prevention, health-care, diagnosis, and treatment, medicine aims at the well-being of the patient in his reality and has an aesthetic dimension. For example the activity of diagnosis implies a composition of various collected elements in a global picture, which is not the simple juxtaposition of parts, but relies on aesthetic criteria; medical practice involves several performative dimensions such as temporality, narration or scenography, whose efficacy and sense must also be understood in aesthetic terms; the way of coping and living with diseases and sufferings as well as the style of the interaction of medical professionals and patients have an aesthetic quality. The symposium will place emphasis, on the aesthetic component underling the different levels of medical practice: in the history of medicine and in clinical practice today, from the level of the relationship and dialogue between caregiver and patient, to the institutional level. Between the recent and future "turns" in bioethics, what is the place for the aesthetical perspective?
