## Technological intrusions in human life: from utopia to dystopia?

Chair: Ignaas Devisch

For quite some time now, numerous conferences are organized to predict how due to technology, we as human beings, will be modified in the future. Time and again, this future is called 'uncertain', be it as a threat, be it as an opportunity to solve all of our problems. Apparently, we know that for sure, that the future will differ substantially from our times. Today, talking about ehealth or human enhancement, this also seems to be the case. Once again, our future will be reshaped substantially, and apparently, we know it for sure. Either utopia will become real or the apocalypse is awaiting us. Analyzing this, one cannot but conclude that we were quite sure about the uncertainty of the future. Today, this might come to an end. For a long time, we could endlessly speculate about how to live when certain technologies would become true. As technology – whole genome sequencing, xeno-transplantation, nano-technology, big data – is already at work, we do no longer have to speculate about what might happen. We need to start from what happens as we speak. Therefore, the ethical question has shifted from 'how to avoid certain technologies to become real' to 'do we want to make use of what does exist already'? In other words, as always ethics is too late. But philosophy might still save us, not from a dark future, but from the idea that we would need to be saved from something, i.e. a dark future. Lectures will be held on genome sequencing, privacy and sharing of data, philosophy and the fiction of science, etc. This *special session* consists of five short input talks (10 Min. each) and an open roundtable where the audience can participate.

	Mapping the social implications of neuroscience					
	Chairs: Tuija Takala & Gardar Arnason					
10.30-12.55	Neuroethics, as a distinct research field, is still rather young. In the year 2002 the first major neuroethics conference was held in San Francisco, California. The title of the conference was "Neuroethics: Mapping the Field." In the words of one of the pioneers of neuroethics, Judy Illes, the common mission of neuroethics "is to examine the ethical, legal and social implications of neuroscience today." This special seminar explores the possible mapping of the social impact of neuroscience, that is, how emerging and future developments in neuroscience may affect ethical norms, laws, regulations and policy, and our very lives. A central tension is between, on the one hand, the enormous possibility of neuroscience to change society and ourselves, and, on the other hand, the sometimes wild overestimation or misrepresentation of what neuroscience can do, now and in the foreseeable future. As we look at current and future developments in neuroscience, we must not let fantastic speculation, or blunt misrepresentation, divert our attention away from the ethical, legal and social issues that have a sound scientific basis. Particular topics addressed in the seminar include reductionism regarding behaviour, neuroenhancement, how neuroscientific observations ("mind-reading") and interventions ("mind-hacking") affect moral responsibility, and the role that the discourse on neuroscience plays in its social implications.
